




## **Tree Art Collecting**

### **Tree Book Review**

Trees: Woodlands and Western Civilisation written in 2003 remains a valid and an interesting reflection on social and cultural relationships with Trees. Richard Hayman traces how people have thought, made art and written about trees and forests from ancient times to the modern day alongside analysis of the concurrent uses and treatment of trees. From Adam & Eve being expelled from Eden for eating from the Tree of Knowledge a subject matter that Albrecht Dürer and his followers mined, via medieval carvings and manuscripts and the works of Shakespeare, to Hardy and the Age of Enlightenment and more recently the war torn trees by Paul Nash. Each generation sees trees revered and also appropriated, for example amidst the Industrial Revolution in America whilst record numbers of trees were cut down, Henry Thoreau withdrew entirely to live in the woods and wrote with great admiration for the species. Has the status quo changed today?

### **Tree Art Exhibitions**

Green Space Dark Skies is a project led by Walk the Plank, with up to 20 "events" taking place from April to September 2022: <a href="https://greenspacedarkskies.uk">https://greenspacedarkskies.uk</a>. During the "events" 20,000 people from all paths in life will become Lumenators, each carrying a low impact light into the landscape to experience beautiful green spaces across the UK. Imagine thousands of lights making patterns on mountains, woodlands, lakes and moorland across England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland and you get the idea. The Walk the Plank team and the Lumenators will take the nation on a journey through our National Parks and Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONBs), to a climactic closing moment across the UK that will be broadcast to millions via the BBC <a href="https://www.bbc.co.uk/mediacentre/2022/countryfile-special-outstanding-landscapes">https://www.bbc.co.uk/mediacentre/2022/countryfile-special-outstanding-landscapes</a>. The events take place in public settings that anyone can visit, any time, for free but not everyone takes the time to enjoy them. Walk the Plank is inviting people who don't usually experience the countryside to take part and to share their stories – before, during and after.

Forest Wake This Ground at the Arnolfini Gallery, Bristol celebrates what lies above and below the forest floor with a major group exhibition including artists, writers, filmmakers, and composers drawn from across the globe: Rodrigo Arteaga, Mark Garry, Alma Heikkilä, Eva Jospin, Jumana Manna, Zakiya Mckenzie, David Nash, Maria Nepomuceno, John Newling, Rose Nguyen, Ben Rivers, Ai Weiwei, and Hildegard Westerkamp. The exhibition really is a fantastic opportunity to sample the sheer breadth of contemporary artwork inspired by Trees from across the world and is such a testament to the tenacity and determination of the Arnolfini team to have managed to coordinate such an inspiring and inclusive exhibition. With works that recycle, reuse and repurpose resources, the artists have explored forests' ancient rhythms, as well as re-discovered stories, myths, and folktales, passed down between people over centuries. The underlying theme is without doubt the impact the changing climate has on nature and the world around us. Visit their website for more information:
